Walk this way

Spot sea eagles, wallabies, learn about local Aboriginal tribes and convict sea wrecks while soaking up some of the most dramatic scenery in Tasmania.

It's all wrapped up on a five-hour day walk around Cape Hauy, a section of the multi-day 46 kilometre Three Capes Track, which will open in November 2015.

You don't have to be Bear Grylls to complete the Cape Hauy section. The tour, run by Taswegian guides, has a maximum of six



guests and includes a lunch stop looking out to Australia's highest sea cliffs, at Cape Pillar, with a mug of billy tea in hand.

The tour includes use of a day pack, wet-weather gear and runs Saturdays, Tuesdays

and Thursdays departing from Hobart at 8am, returning 5pm. Costs \$195 adults, \$145 children (12-16 years). Not suitable for younger children. Phone 1300 660 144, see lovetasmaniatours.com.au.
